New Paul Harris Fellows



Four new Paul Harris Fellowships were awarded at the Changeover Meeting June 19th. This adds to the two previously awarded by the RCNS earlier in the year. The Paul Harris Fellowship is the highest honour that Rotary clubs bestow.

Rotarians Sue O'Dwyer and Paul Zorad were recognized for their ongoing superb work with and dedication to the Pumpkinfest Spookhouse since its inception. Paul had left the meeting due to parental responsibilities shortly before his honour was announced. Rotarian Lucine McKay was recognized for her untiring work with a broad array of community groups in Norfolk – a list too long to recite. We hear regu-

larly from Lucine about Cancer Society programs, but that's only the tip.

Mrs. Helen McLean was the fourth recipient, in absentia, of the award. Mrs. McLean, an 87-year old lady, has contributed many thousands of dollars over two decades through Rotary to Operation Eyesight.

One week earlier our club presented a Paul Harris Fellowship award to Angus McLeod for his service to the Norfolk community in music. Several weeks previous an award was presented to Rotarians Ton Dicke and Laura Young for their work with the Temagami Youth Experience.



Hospital Campaign Excitement

The campaign to raise funds to upgrade Norfolk General Hospital is off to a shotgun start. At the campaign kick-off on Thursday night, Donna Raytrowsky announced excitedly that \$4.9 million has been pledged already, representing 70% of the \$7 million needed. The public campaign now begins. John Race also addressed the kick-off audience. An excerpt from John's presentation is printed below.

Speaking of great people I want to say that we in Norfolk have the greatest health care team in all of Ontario, and they deserve better.

Just imagine a 3,000 square foot emergency room and approximately 33,000 patient visitors in one year – with 1 public washroom.

Let's take a moment and relate the ER to our home circumstances. A small bungalow home of 1,200 square feet with no basement and no garage, with over 13,000 visitors a year. Think of cleaning the washroom – think of the snow boot problem.

Back to the emergency room: no privacy, no comforting area, and no diagnostic rooms. No wonder our doctors and nurses are frustrated.

But they don't quit – they work on. They need our help, and they need it now.

Our Club has been asked to pledge \$100,000, over 5 years. Cigar Night proceeds totalled \$11,500, and the Club voted Tuesday evening to forward another \$8,500 for the current year. The remainder of any commitment by RCNS will be dealt with by the new Executive. Since President Steve Malo is a member of the NGH fundraising team, we can be assured this issue will not be forgotten over the coming year.
