This fund raiser for the Norfolk General Hospital Family Fund is probably one of the most worthwhile yet fun events Rotary Sunrise gets involved in. Come on out and help us leave John Race and the Port Dover Lions in our wake. As one of the 'hottest' summer outdoor events in Port Dover, the Dragon Boat Race Festival brings sport, multicultural entertainment and international flavour to all. The event draws paddlers and fans together to celebrate a legend that dates back over 2,000 years.

THE LEGEND...TODAY

The legend of Qu Yuan, the poet/philosopher and his political protest against a corrupt regime remains an important celebration in Chinese culture, and has become a world-wide sporting event.

In the fourth century B.C., China was under political and military strife. This era is also known as the Warring States period. Qu Yuan, disgruntled with the ruler and the state of affairs, protested against the regime by jumping into the Mei Lo River. According to legend, local fishermen,



upon seeing their beloved poet's act of courage, raced out with their boats in an attempt to save him. To their dismay, they arrived too late. To prevent his body from being eaten by the fish, they beat the waters furiously with their paddles and threw rice dumplings wrapped in silk into the river to distract the fish. The re-enactment of the villagers racing out to save Qu Yuan has become today's dragon boat race festival. Celebrated on the fifth day of the fifth lunar month of the Chinese calendar, dragon boat racing is an annual event held in over 40 countries. All around the world, people have embraced this water sport and formed dragon boat racing clubs in their own countries.

Marjorie Dawson

On Tuesday July 8, 2003, The Rotary Club of Norfolk Sunrise was privileged to have Marjorie Dawson do her classification talk.

Marjorie, as we all know, has accepted a position as CEO of Portland Pipe Line, which is headquartered in Portland, Maine. The company is owned by Imperial, Petro Canada



and Shell. Marjorie agreed to assume the responsibilities of this position even though she has never visited the Portland area. She will be supervising a facility that can move 150 Million barrels of crude oil per year. To put this into perspective, Nanticoke handles approximately 100,000 barrels a day. Marjorie explained that there are 4 types of crude oil: light, which is more expensive; heavy, which contains more asphalt; and sweet and sour. Sweet and sour terms were derived from the tasting of the crude, Sour crude has more sulphur. A barrel of crude oil is 42 US gallons. They use to be 45 US gallons that were transported in wooden barrels, but as Marjorie said they use to leak and lose 3 gallons of stuff ". The material of the barrels now is either plastic or steel and contain 42 gallons. The Portland facility has a storage capacity of 3.5 million barrels of crude oil, which is stored in storage tanks. Portland has neat technology to help the docking of the ships. Each ship has a dead weight of 200,000 tons. Marjorie will be in charge of the pipeline that goes from Portland to Montreal. Her first priority will be to undertake an air surveillance of the pipeline. She would also like to investigate the possibility of dredging the harbour to possibly improve or increase their market. Some of Marjorie's additional responsibilities will be engineering, and administrative duties such as payroll and payables. There are many legal issues that have to be dealt with because of a right of way that crosses through 2 countries, U.S. (including 3 states) and Canada, and each entity have their own policies. There are many environmental concerns, due to the fact that the pipeline goes through prime vacation property, plus sensitive properties such as residential neighbourhoods and marshes. There are many security issues because there are 250 miles of unprotected pipeline that can run through peoples backyards. Keith Jones commented that Marjorie is a CEO that is concerned about the environment.

Marjorie enjoys hiking, cross country skiing and canoeing and feels that it should be really good in the Portland area. Marjorie plans to look at 8 houses a day on Thursday and Friday and narrow it down to 3 and make an offer by Sunday. She should have a house by Tuesday July 15, 2003.

On a more serious note, Marjorie mentioned a tragedy where she had lost a friend. This individual was assumed to be having a heart attack, but in fact, was choking and choked to death. Marjorie implored everyone with a knowledge of CPR to look at all possibilities in order to avoid such a tragic incident.
