The members in attendance had a chat about the opportunity to cap up our donation to the Family Fund for Norfolk General Hospital. If we donate an additional \$5K to top up our total to \$25K, then one of the new rooms will be dedicated/named as having been sponsored by the Rotary Club of Norfolk Sunrise. Charlie reviewed the preliminary budget for us, and it was pointed out by Jim P. that a surplus of \$18K is sitting in the CLUB ACTIVITIES account. He put a motion on the floor, seconded by Sue O'D, that we withdraw \$5K from that surplus. The reasoning here was that our club's operating costs for 3 months is approx. \$8K, so this still leaves lots in reserve. -- The club voted in favour of this motion.

The programme strives to improve international understanding and world peace by enabling young people from different countries to learn from each other. Team members must be between 25 and 40 years of age, reside in Hamilton to Simcoe area, Niagara Peninsula, Western New York state and be either a citizen of Canada or USA. While abroad,

team members visit their vocational counterparts, observe their hosts' way of life and study the host nation's economic, social, and cultural characteristics. All travel, plus cost of room and board, is provided by the Rotary International Foundation, Rotary Clubs in District 7090 and in the host Rotary District 3600.

BAKING WITH SUE

WITCH'S FINGER COOKIES (makes 5 doz.)

- 1 c butter (softened)
- 1 c icing sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp almond extract
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 ¾ c. flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- ¾ c. whole blanched almonds
- 1 tube red decorator gel

Sue's note: When Lynn B makes these cookies, she only gets 6-7 fingers per batch, cause they're so HONKIN' big!

Beat together butter, sugar, egg, almond and vanilla. Stir in flour, baking powder, salt. Cover and put in fridge for 30 mins. Work with ¼ of dough at a time – keeping balance in fridge. Roll heaping teaspoonful into finger shape for each cookie. Squeeze in centre, to create knuckle shape, use paring knife to make slashes to form knuckle.

Press almond firmly into one end for fingernail. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake @ 325 for 20-25 mins or until pale golden. Let cool 3 mins.

Lift almond, squeeze red gel into nail bed and press almond back into place, so gel oozes out from underneath. Remove from baking sheet, let cool on racks.

OPTIONS: Use green gel for sickly green fingers, and chocolate chip for wart.
